PREFACE

"Improving the development of these tools [satellites] and their wider use, particularly in the most vulnerable and affected regions, will be paramount to support timely adaptation actions to reduce climate risks in the context of global warming." Marie-Fanny Racault, Chapter 3. Oceans and Coastal Ecosystems and Their Services, IPCC Sixth Assessment report, February 2022.

In 2017, during the first One Planet Summit, the Space for Climate Observatory (SCO) initiative was born to fully leverage the potential of Earth observation data in the adaptation and fight against climate change. Two years later, the French President officially announced its launch during the Paris Air Show, where twenty-three space agencies and international organizations met to sign the Joint Declaration of interest.

Today, with almost fifty partners and more than seventy projects around the world, the network is structured around an international Charter and is recognized as a major player relying on increasingly available satellite data to contribute to the climate effort.

Thanks to the mobilization of numerous scientific organizations alongside public institutions and private companies, the general public and local decision-makers are gradually gaining access to crucial tools to better understand and anticipate present and future climate challenges.

Whether it is a question of monitoring extreme weather events, water and forest management policies, biodiversity protection or prospects for adapting our cities and countryside, the services and platforms of the SCO provide essential decision-making tools for actors and stakeholders. These projects now allow many territories to move forward with resilient actions that are essential to the fight against global warming.

Following the COP27, which reaffirmed the need to step up international efforts to reduce anthropogenic emissions in the short term, and the need to mobilise for the adaptation of the most vulnerable territories to the inevitable consequences of climate change, the SCO International Initiative wishes to provide its expertise and full contribution.

The present Work Programme, in line with the above-mentioned IPCC quote, is the opportunity to foster the emergence of valuable state-of-the-art EO applications through targeted and coordinated actions. To reach more players and territories, SCO members are called upon to **implement a common set of global, regional, national and local actions** fostering cooperation between a wide range of stakeholders. Coordinated and inclusive response is crucial to combine our ambitions and deploy tools to strengthen adaptation and resilience of vulnerable populations.

The Work Programme will run for the next two years (2023-2025). It includes sections on previous activities, objectives and corresponding activities with a schedule. It encompasses SCO Project activities, Working Group activities, Secretariat activities and national activities of the Signatories whenever possible. The Work Programme is prepared by the Secretariat, reviewed by the Programme Committee and approved by the Steering Committee. Work Programmes are made public by the Secretariat.

The present Work Programme is submitted for the approval of the Steering Committee at its 12th meeting held at the International Astronautical Congress (IAC) 2023 in Baku, Azerbaijan, on October 3rd, 2023.



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1. Programme Committee



Recalling Article 6.2 of the Charter,

The Programme Committee is in charge of overseeing the implementation of SCO activities, with the support of the Secretariat. In particular, it is responsible for:

- drafting the Work Programme (Article 7.1);
- ensuring that SCO Projects match the required criteria (Article 7.2);
- monitoring work within dedicated Working Groups (Article 7.3).
- tracking the progress of SCO Project and Working Group activities towards the achievement of the objectives defined in Article 3 and detailed in the Work Programme;

The Programme Committee is composed of a restricted number of Focal Points and oversees the implementation of SCO activities.

The main ambition of the Programme Committee is to encourage, stimulate and replicate SCO projects, to strengthen the involvement of focal points in the creation of national and regional SCOs, and to raise global awareness of SCO activities and lead the international network.

In the long term, the ambition is that each focal point will be able to foster its national ecosystem and bring forward accredited projects at the international level.

For this purpose, the Programme Committee is mainly in charge of drafting the Work Programme on a biannual basis with the support of the Secretariat.

Therefore, the Programme Committee, with the support of the Secretariat, is responsible for drafting and publishing reports to assess the progress of Work Programmes activities and their results as they reach conclusion. These reports will be presented to the Steering Committee and made publicly available.



2. Work Programme


The Work Programme is the primary instrument used by SCO to facilitate collaboration among its members and with other partners in application of the Charter and the Rules of Procedure.

The Work Programme provides structure and guidance for pragmatic and result-oriented cooperation in mutually agreed thematic fields. With respect to the expected governance outcomes within SCO activities, it is to be executed in the period 2023-2025. The Work Programme summarizes anticipated activities for subsequent years, to be overseen by the Programme Committee. As stated by the Rules of Procedure, it will be updated yearly.

Its aim is threefold:

- to define common objectives and set out a plan for implementation of SCO activities, making the initiative an active and wide forum for all entities using EO for concrete climate applications;
 - to foster and replicate SCO projects;
- to increase global awareness of SCO activities, using relevant communication relays, among worldwide stakeholders involved in public decision-making on the impacts of climate change.

SCO Work Programme activities are largely funded through in-kind contributions from SCO Members, on a voluntary, best-effort basis, supplemented by financial contributions where possible or appropriate.

Annex 1 – Governance and Secretariat activities

OBJECTIVES	ACTIONS
	Rules of Procedure adoption: completed in 2023
	The first version of the Rules of Procedure (SCO/RP/2023/01) was adopted by consensus on 24 May 2023 during the 11 th Steering Committee meeting. The present Rules of Procedure can be revised by a two-thirds majority decision of the Steering Committee. The Rules of Procedure enable the implementation of new deliverables as detailed by the present Work Programme by 2025.
	Programme Committee set-up
	The first operational Programme Committee was elected with a two-thirds majority of focal points on 24 May 2023 during the 11 th Steering Committee meeting. The next Programme Committee will be elected at a Steering Committee meeting in 2025.
	Establishing a Working Group
Implement SCO Governance	All Focal Points, and Signatories through their Focal Points, may to submit a proposal to create a specific Working Group. The Secretariat will collect proposals from September 2023. The Secretariat will then arrange the review of proposals by the Programme Committee for submission to the Steering Committee. This process will be operated on a regular basis. Working Groups are mainly invited to foster expertise sharing, SCO project replication and promotion of SCO projects at international or regional level.
	Implementing a due diligence framework to review private entities membership applications
	Since the SCO works as an international network, some focal points have their own due diligence internal process to ensure compliance of the private sector with their proper ethical, social, and environmental requirements. In order to articulate and coordinate these different procedures, the secretariat propose to the Programme Committee to build a unique due diligence process with focal points applicable to the initiative. To steer this process, UNDP offered its expertise.
	The main objectives of this process, to be commonly built, are to (i) avoid duplication of efforts between SCO members having their own due diligence process, (ii) provide for an easy to steer and light process, (iii) ensure a coherent and consistent assessment of the private sector involvement within the initiative.
	Prepare and Organize SCO governance meetings
Operate SCO Governance	Steering Committee: Secretariat will organize all Steering Committee meetings in accordance with the present Work Programme. Programme Committee: Secretariat will organize Programme Committee meetings at least four (4) times a year.
	International Panel of reviewers in charge of reviewing SCO calls: Secretariat will organize the coordination meeting of the panel as well as SCO project applicant pitches prior to accreditation. This panel will be renewed annually.

The Secretariat will assist Working Group Chairs in their activities to the greatest extent feasible.

Oversee Working Groups

The Programme Committee tracks the progress of Working Group activities towards the achievement of the objectives defined in Article 3 of the Charter and detailed in the Work Programme.

Increase the number of Signatories	The objective for this mandate is to strengthen existing international as well as local partnerships, and to forge new ones, such as the existing partnership with the Group on Earth Observations (GEO). Formal relationships are envisioned with climate-related institutions and initiatives: United Nations institutions, Conference of the Parties, World Meteorological Organization, World Climate Research Programme, Committee on Earth Observation Satellites, Destination Earth, European Commission (especially the Directorate General for Climate Action), European Centre for Medium-range Weather Forecasts, European Organization for the Exploitation of Meteorological Satellites, European Space Agency, Global Development Assistance Programme, etc. In terms of geographical reach, South America, Africa and the Indo-Pacific region are priorities. Alongside local, national, regional and international policies, the scientific community, space agencies and civil society, new stakeholders are targeted as future partners. New Space companies focused on Earth-observation satellite data and climate services are identified as crucial partners both in Europe and globally. The New Space industry is expected to continue to grow and to drive innovation through advances in satellite technology and data analytics, in response to increasing demand for climate monitoring and mitigation solutions. Their involvement in the SCO will spur development of innovative solutions with state-of-the-art technologies. Beyond innovation, the involvement of the private sector will ensure the long-term viability of SCO projects by initiating a sustainable service business model. The SCO envisions coordinating with major international conferences (Conference of the Parties, for instance) and congresses (International Astronautical Congress, for instance) to organize SCO Charter signing ceremonies. Accordingly, the Working Group dedicated to SCO global awareness, steered by UNOOSA, is particularly identified as an enabling tool for extending SCO partner

The purpose of this SCO strategy will be to define communication priorities, objectives, target audience, key messages and determine the necessary tools and vehicles for the communication and programme requirements.
	Additionally, this strategy shall be used to promote and communicate the SCO to key audiences and stakeholders by clearly identifying the SCO benefits to internal, external and public stakeholders. This strategy should furthermore guide and lead towards a comprehensive SCO awareness raising material production which can be aligned, modified and coordinated in conjunction with the various SCO activities and its planned development in the coming years.
	Develop a set of material to support awareness-raising efforts and allowing the
Develop SCO awareness raising material	SCO community to share the key facts about the SCO efforts. Building on the strategy a set of key awareness raising materials should be developed to support the growth of the SCO community as well as for outreach and awareness raising at different occasions. This effort can include, but is not limited to, the definition of unified language, promotion guidance, set of articles, interviews, promotion guidelines, standardized presentation material.
SCO Website	Maintenance and updating The Secretariat is in charge of maintaining and updating the SCO website. SCO members are encouraged to share, with the Secretariat, information on their actions within the initiative and their climate-related national actions. National and regional SCOs are invited to create their webpage on SCO website with the support of the Secretariat.

	National and regional ecosystems are invited to respond to the SCO international call and to fund a dedicated SCO national and regional call, whenever appropriate and feasible.
	National or regional members are also encouraged to use relevant communication relays to raise awareness of SCO activities (relaying SCO international calls, SCO events, hosting dedicated webinars or workshops).




Annex 4 – SCO project-related activities: Accreditation process

OBJECTIVES	ACTIONS
Set up and manage the international accreditation process	Implement the international accreditation process
	This mandate will be the opportunity to issue international calls for projects led by SCO members. SCO international calls will be open to all countries. This tool aims to foster and spawn SCO projects and enable them to be replicated, to multiply the number of national and regional SCO branches and drive the SCO international network in order to share results from the first completed projects.
	SCO will launch its first international call for projects on 4 September 2023 to accredit the development of EO-based operational tools for climate adaptation, mitigation and monitoring. The SCO Programme Committee, with support from international experts, is in charge of steering international calls. Further annual international calls are expected in 2024 and 2025.
	Create an international panel of reviewers Launch and manage the international call for proposals (reviews, accreditation)
	To operate international accreditation, a panel of reviewers will be established in 2023. This panel will be dedicated to reviewing annual international calls.
	To implement this panel, the Secretariat will send out a registration application form to all Focal Points, to canvass their interest in joining the international panel of reviewers. Focal Points are expected to submit their proposals from June 2023. Priority will be given to new members on a rotating basis and to the greatest extent feasible. This panel will be overseen and reviewed annually by the Programme Committee.
	Stimulate national and regional calls for proposals
	SCO members can put together independent national calls dedicated to SCO projects, according to their specific needs and budget. National calls are open to nationals of the country steering and financing the call.
	National and regional calls for proposals within the SCO will be submitted to their national and regional internal review process with their own financial support. Every initiative is welcome within the SCO as long as it complies with SCO criteria. Accredited projects will be presented to the Programme Committee for final approval.
	To date, two independent national SCO calls for projects have been issued in the United Kingdom and in France.
